The weather in Finland can be very diverse, from very cold to very hot, wet, dry or snow.


Depending on what weather you want, it is therefore good to look at the average weather type in the different months. It is also important to know what nature looks like in those months.

At the beginning of the village of Savonranta there is a gas station that had to close due to possible contamination of the soil.


